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

Tell City provides stiff defense during their '68-'69 season.


The Marksmen opened their 1968 football season by defeating Jasper 7-6. The combination of Dave Mahoney and Mike Malone proved deadly for the Wildcats, just as it did for other squads who fell to the Big Red.

The Marksmen dropped only 2 games in the '68 season. The Providence Pioneers clipped the Marksmen's winning streak at five games by defeating them 6-3. A highly rated Vincennes team stunned the Big Red with a 21-14 blow.

The Marksmen were co-champions in the SIAC this season with North Knox. Both the Big Red and the North Knox Warriors were 5-0 in conference play.







In Victory, Defeat Marksmen Show



The Marksmen opened the 1968-69 basketball season by defeating the Cannelton Bulldogs 68-48. The Big Red went on to finish the year with a 17 and 7 record. This is the best season Coach Robert Lochmuller has had in his 4 years at TCHS.

After defeating Cannelton, the Big Red went on to beat Bosse 62-61. Then the varsity hit a dry spell and lost their next three games to North, Ferdinand, and Ft. Branch. After losing three in a row, the Marksmen went on to win 15 of their next 19 games.

The Big Red won the sectional by defeating Milltown, Cannelton, and Perry Central. To win the sectional, Fred Werner hit a 50 foot shot in the last seconds of play to advance the Marksmen to the Regional. At the regional Tell City almost pulled an upset over favored Evansville Rex Mundi, but in the closing minutes the Monarchs surged ahead and won 62-56.














