







# FIRST LOVE


The Junior/Senior Prom was held at the National Guard Armory April 24, 1981.










Many students took a new interest in the government as a result of the Presidential election held last year.










This year, Tell City High School added another winter sport to the schedule. Swimming was added because of the indoor pool which was designed in the new building.



Tim Reed, a junior, was Coach Page's only diver for the Marksmen.


Tim swam in the State sectional where he placed third.





The girls' track team should be strong next year since they lost no seniors.

















This year, instead of the usual after-school meetings, the yearbook had its own class which was taught by Miss Sermersheim.



Sixteen new members were inducted into the society. To be eligible for the National Honor Society, students must have a 3.3 grade point average after five semesters.




## Club de Español Cercle Francais Deutschverein







# Custodians




